Individual Leadership

At the basic level of 4-H Leadership projects youth start developing and exploring:

- individual strengths
- personal sense of leadership
- what makes an impactful leader
- what qualities do they want to possess as a leader
- goals of future leadership involvement

Group Leadership

The intermediate level of 4-H Leadership projects youth take their skills to the next level by:

- applying skillsets developed in the basic level of leadership
- assuming leadership opportunities in their clubs and community
- searching out a mentor with like ideals and goals

Community Leadership

The advanced level of 4-H Leadership projects take youth to the highest level of leadership engagement through:

- serving in a leadership position on the district or state level
- mentoring younger 4-H members
- identifying community needs and developing ways to address those needs



Step It Up!

Pass it on! Now that you know how, share it with others. Here are ideas to get you started.

Communication

- Exercise your written and oral communication skills by participating in the interview and resume contest.
- Write an article for your local newspaper highlighting your experience at a 4-H leadership event.

Citizenship

- Host an international exchange student through the Kentucky 4-H International Program.
- Become a mentor for a younger 4-H member.

Leadership

- Campaign and run for a club, district or state officer position.
- Apply for State Teen Council to represent your county.
- Share your skills by presenting at a leadership conference or event.
