







### Scholarship Fund Requirements:

- Only Graduating High School Seniors qualify.
- Must have been involved in a 4-H Shooting sports program for two (2) years or more.
- Applicants must have a 2.5 GPA or higher.
- Applicant must submit a complete application, two (2) letters of recommendation (one letter must be from a coordinator/coach in 4-H Shooting Sports), resume and a recent photo (preferably head and shoulders photo). Incomplete applications will not be given consideration.
- Prior to funds being awarded, the recipient must first provide confirmation of enrollment and acceptance in a post-secondary educational institution.

### Funds:

- One \$1,000 scholarship is awarded annually.
- The scholarship is non-renewable for an individual.
- Funds are for use in any post-secondary institution/technical school, not limited to Kentucky.
- Funds can be spent on anything related to higher education expenses, e.g. food, lodging, mileage, tuition, supplies, etc.
- The Funds will be dispersed in August each year. The check will be made payable to the recipient for \$1,000 in August – be aware that there may be tax implications with a lump sum payment.

Deadline to Apply: June 1<sup>st</sup> each year (Must be postmarked by this date).

Recipient Selection date: July 1<sup>st</sup> each year.
